Analyse	To look at something in detail
Audience	People who receive a message or watch a performance
Data	Number or facts collected to prove something.
Enquiry	An investigation into a question
Impact	The influence one thing has on another
Improvement	To make something better than it was
Present	To show something to other people
Process	A society where one religion is dominant.
Risk	A situation where something may be dangerous
Route	A way to get from one place to another, marked on a map
Viewpoint	A particular way of thinking about something.

Data Collection methods

The children will evaluate which data collection methods are appropriate for different types of fieldwork.

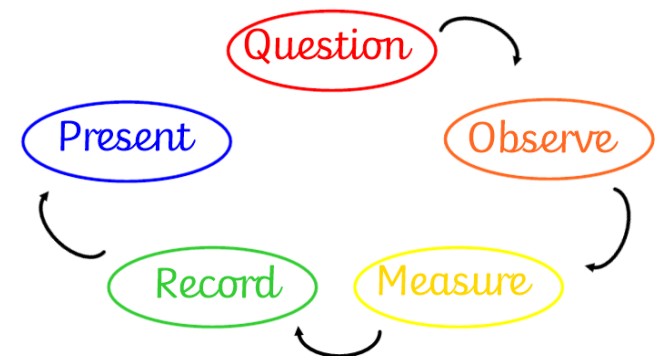
Afterwards they will then decide which data collection method will be most effective for their chosen enquiry.

The infographic illustrates eight data collection methods with corresponding illustrations:

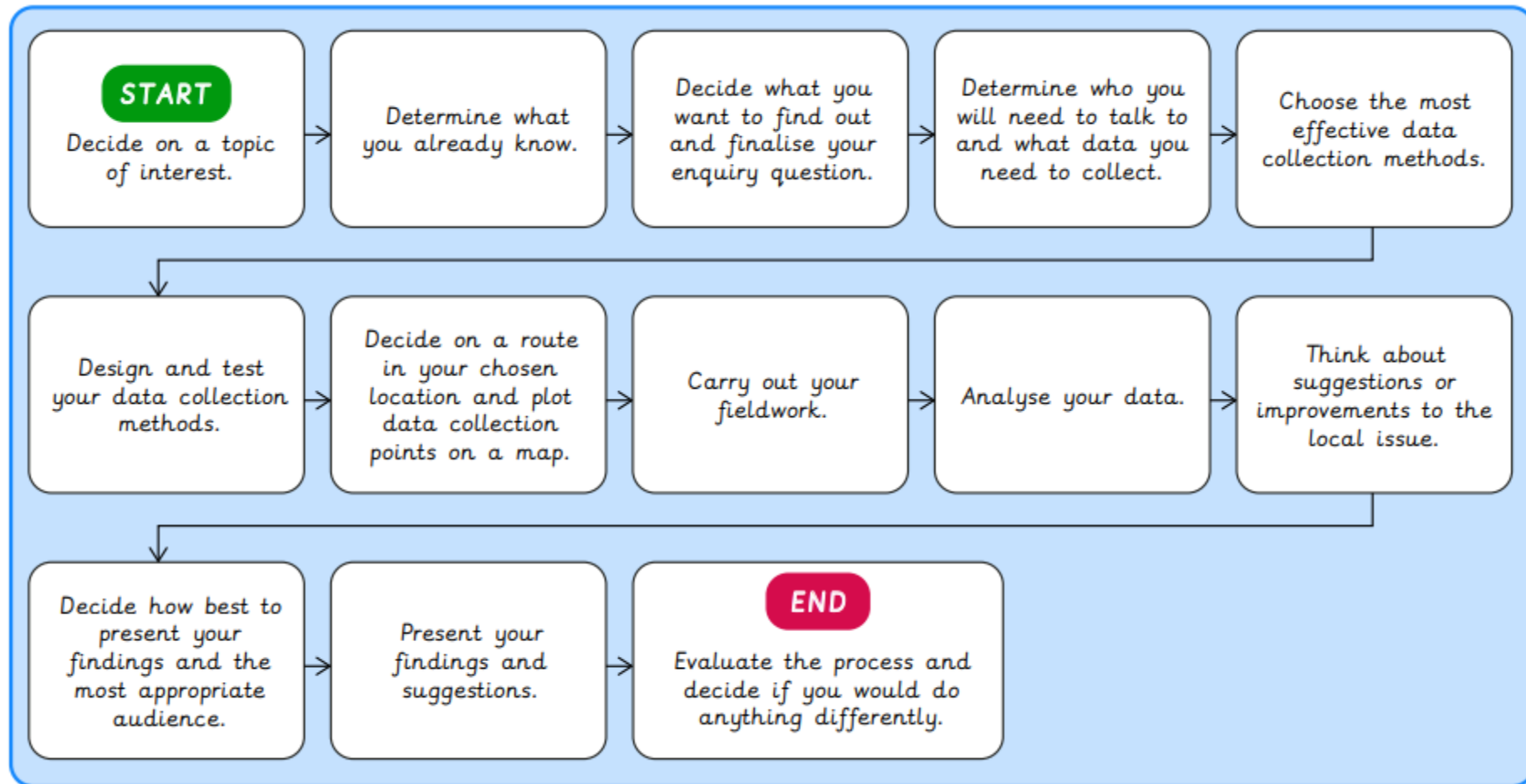
- Interviews:** Two children talking.
- Sound recordings:** A smartphone with musical notes.
- Photographs:** A camera.
- Annotated sketches:** A child drawing a building on a piece of paper.
- Likert scales:** A card with the text "I find this location attractive." and a scale from "agree" to "disagree".
- Sketch maps:** A child drawing a map on a board.
- Questionnaires:** A child holding a clipboard and talking to an adult.
- Tally charts:** A table with columns for 'item' and 'tally'.
